



The Great Wave off Kanagawa (Japanese: 神奈川沖浪裏, also known as The Great Wave or The Wave, is a woodblock print by the Japanese ukiyo-e artist Hokusai. It was created in 183 in the late Edo period as the first print in Hokusai's series Thirty-six Views of Mount Fuji. The image depicts an enormous wave threatening three boats off the coast in the Sagami Bay (Kanagawa Prefecture) while Mount Fuji rises in the background. Sometimes assumed to be a tsunami, the wave is more likely to be a large rogue wave. It is Hokusai's most famous work and is often considered the most recognizable work of Japanese art in the world.

Directions: Using watercolor paint fill in all of the areas. Add water to make the color lighter.

1=White, 2=Light Blue, 3=Blue, 4=Purple, 5=White, 6=Very Light yellow-Orange, 7=Very Light Yellow-Orange, 8=Light Yellow-Orange, 9=Light Yellow-Orange, 10=Black, 11=Yellow-Orange 12=Light Orange, 13= Orange, 14=Light Brown, 15=Brown
